What are SATs?

Towards the end of Key Stage 1, year 2 children will take their SATs (Statutory Assessment Tests). They will consist of:

- A reading comprehension test
- A grammar and spelling test
- An Arithmetic test
- A reasoning and problem solving test

The tests are designed to support and confirm the on- going teacher assessment which happens throughout the year to track your child's progress and attainment. At end of the year your child will be assessed as either working towards year 2, just below year 2, expected level year 2 or working at greater depth within year 2.

When, where and with whom?



During May 2022

All the tests have suggested timings but there is no time limit.

In school and in their normal classrooms where possible

With a familiar adult who they know and feel comfortable with

Reading comprehension

There are 2 reading tests. Children are given 3-4 texts to read. It is often a range of fiction, nonfiction and poetry.

- Comprehension understanding of the text
- Inference making sensible guesses about characters thoughts and feelings
- Sequencing putting events in order
- Vocabulary understand new words in a context

In test 1, the questions are provided in the same book as the text.

In test 2, the questions and the text are in separate booklets. This provides an additional challenge to readers.

None of this test can be read by an adult.

"Let's find the paints," said JJ.


Spelling, punctuation and grammar

This test is broken into 2 parts.


The first is a selection of questions which assess children's understanding of different types of punctation and grammar.

They are then tested on 20 words which form the Year 2 spelling curriculum.

In part 1, questions can be read to your child if we feel it is needed. In part 2, an adult will read the word and the sentence multiple times.


Arithmetic (Maths)

The arithmetic paper will focus on:

- Adding and subtracting a 2 digit number and a 1 digit number e.g. 34 + 7 =
- Adding and subtracting a multiple of 10 from a 2 digit number e.g. 56 20 =
- Multiplication and division using the 2, 5, 10 and 3 times table e.g. 6 x 2
 - = and 25 \div 5 =
- Finding fractions of numbers e.g. ¹/₄ of 20

Therefore it is very important that your child learns their times tables and can recall multiplication facts in any order, quickly.

The questions cannot be read by an adult.



Reasoning (Maths)

The reasoning and problem solving paper requires children to read word problems and use their mathematical knowledge to solve them.

The will often get marks for showing their working out, even if the answer is incorrect.

The questions can be read by an adult if we feel it is necessary.






Each pair of cards has a **total of 70**

Summary

Please don't worry about the SATs tests. The children are used to doing tests in this formalised manner so it won't be a shock to them when they are completing the real test.

The teacher's judgement will determine the final mark your child will get.

Continue to help your child with their reading, spellings and mental maths at home.

Continue to read with your child regularly and ask them questions about the book they are reading.

Continue to make sure your child is ready to learn and not tired.

In school we make it clear that the test is nothing to worry about and that we just want to see how fantastic they are doing. That's why we call them 'Secret Agent Training'!
